

<i>Allsad</i> :	O.N. <i>halsa</i> , 'to slacken a sail.'
<i>As</i> :	O.N. <i>ass</i> , 'the pole to which the lower end of a sail was fastened during a fair wind.'
<i>bat, bad</i> :	O.N. <i>bátr</i> , 'a boat.'
<i>birling</i> :	O.N. <i>byrthingr</i> , 'a transport vessel,' 'a merchant ship.' ¹
<i>carb</i> :	O.N. <i>karfi</i> , 'a ship.'
<i>cnairr</i> :	O.N. <i>knörr</i> , 'a merchant ship.'
<i>laideng</i> :	O.N. <i>leiþangr</i> , 'naval forces.'
<i>lipting</i> :	O.N. <i>lypting</i> , 'a taffrail.'
<i>lunnta, lunn</i> (in reania) :	O.N. <i>hlunnr</i> , 'the handle of an oar.'
<i>scib</i> :	O.N. <i>skip</i> , 'a ship,' whence also are derived <i>sciobaire</i> , 'a sailor' and <i>scipad</i> and <i>sgiobadh</i> , 'to make ready for sailing.'
<i>tile</i> :	O.N. <i>thili</i> , 'a plank,' 'the bottom board in a boat.'
<i>Thusdais</i> (? teldass) :	O.N. <i>tjaldáss</i> , 'the horizontal top-mast of a ship.'
<i>uicing</i> , a word used for 'a fleet' :	O.N. <i>Vikingr</i> , 'one who haunts a bay or creek.'
<i>uiginnecht</i> , piracy :
